

DE LACY SHINES FOR TRINITY

Well-Known Citizen Killed

Accident In Ballinacurra

Mr. J. S. McNeice, City Coroner, opened an inquest at the County Infirmary on Monday touching the death of Patrick O'Connor, O'Connell Avenue, who was killed after being struck by a motor car in Ballinacurra on Saturday night.

Supt. Meehan conducted the enquiry, and Mr. M. Fitzgerald, B.L., representing Mr. T. O'B. Kelly, held a watching brief for the next-of-kin, and Mr P. G. Collins appeared for Sergeant J. Morris, Gortacloaghane Outpost, Listowel, the driver of the car.

Supt. Meehan, opening the proceedings, said—This is another of the tragedies which are becoming all too frequent. It was a case which required the fullest investigation, and after evidence of identification and medical evidence, I will ask for an adjournment of these proceedings.

Patrick O'Connor, son of the deceased, said his father was 68 years of age, and was buyer at Messrs. Wm. Todd & Co. He last saw his father alive at 6 p.m. on Saturday evening, when he was in his usual good health. He suffered from no physical disability. Witness had seen the body, and identified it as that of his father.

Dr. C. Moloney said that at 8.15 p.m. on Saturday night he was called urgently to No. 5 County View Terrace. There he found Mr. O'Connor lying on the floor of the diningroom. He was unconscious, and had a severe wound over the left temple. He had a fracture of the base of the skull, and died while being conveyed by ambulance to hospital, as a result of the injuries received. Death, in his opinion, was due to compression of the brain, following fracture of the base of the skull.

Dr. B. Crawford, County Infirmary, said the deceased was dead on admission to hospital. He had incised wounds over the left temple and eye, and death was due to laceration of the brain, following fracture of the base of the skull.

EXPRESSIONS OF SYMPATHY.

Supt. Meehan expressed deep sympathy with the relatives of the deceased in what appeared to be a terrible tragedy and said he had no further evidence to offer at this stage.

The Coroner adjourned the inquest sine die, and joined with the Superintendent in expressing sympathy with the relatives of the deceased.

Mr. P. G. Collins, on behalf of the driver of the car, and Mr. J. Byrnes, on behalf of the jury, also associated themselves with the expression of sympathy.
