Coming out of a number of prosecutions heard on Friday at Limerick City Court by Mr. J. M. Flood, B.L., warnings were issued that the law on the sale of milk would be stringently enforced from this on. Michael Shine, a milk vendor, was fined for a breach of the city dairy regulations.

J. J. Dundon, Chief Veterinary Inspector, stated that he saw the defendant carrying a pail of milk and place the same on the ground.

The defendant, who was examined by Mr. B. Fitzgerald, solicitor, defending, stated that all the milk contained in the pail was delivered to the one person. Justice—As there is some doubt in this case will dismiss the summons.

Scene in Rome

Federal Secretary's Declaration.

Italian students staged a demonstration before the French Embassy in Rome to-day. All the streets leading to the embassy were blocked during the scene. The students claimed Mussolini, and in response to their demand, the Federal Secretary of the Fascist Party addressed the demonstration. He stated that the time was approaching when the claim would have to be met by France.

Herr Von Ribbentrop, German Foreign Minister, had a police guard when he arrived at the Centennial Exhibition in Paris, to-day, to conclude the French No War Pact.
