BUTTER DEARER TO-DAY

Butter will cost a penny more per lb. as from to-day.

The Minister for Agriculture has made an Order under the Dairy Produce (Price Stabilisation) Act, 1935, increasing as from 10th December the present minimum prices of creamery butter to 147s. per cwt. for lots of not less than 20 cwts., and 151s. per cwt. for lots of less than 20 cwt. The change represents an increase of 9s. per cwt. (approximately 1d. per lb. in the present prices of creamery butter).

The effect of this will be that as from to-day the retail price of creamery butter will be 1s. 6d. per lb. instead of 1s. 5d. The issue of the new Order was indicated in a statement made in the Dail last week by Dr. Ryan. The intention presumably is to stimulate winter dairying.

£80 CAR ON THE MARKET.

An £80 motor car—the Lloyd—has been placed on the market in England. The road tax is £4 10s.

Power is supplied by a 350 c.c. two-stroke water-cooled engine, mounted over the rear wheels. All four wheels are independently sprung. Fifty miles an hour to the gallon are claimed.
