## Wireless Broadcasting in Publichouses

### Injunction Granted Against Limerick Publican

Before Mr Justice Johnston in the High Court, Dublin, on Monday, an application was made by Mr Tudgh Forbes on behalf of the Performing Right Society, Copyright House, Margaret street, London, for judgment in default of defence against James O'Dwyer and his wife, Mrs Josephine O'Dwyer, publicans, 3 Mulgrave street, Limerick, against whom they claimed an injunction to restrain them from infringing the copyright by performing in public, or by authorizing the performance in public, of musical works of which the right of performance is in the plaintiff, without the leave of the plaintiffs, and an injunction to restrain the defendants from permitting O'Dwyer's bar, at the address mentioned, to receive any other piece of entertainment under their control or owned by them to be used for the performance in public of such works.

In their statement of claim, the plaintiffs stated that on the 27th of October, 1937, the defendants infringed their rights by performing in public at O'Dwyer's bar the musical works 'Valencia' and 'Isle of Capri.' On the 28th of October, 1937, they infringed the plaintiffs' copyright by performing 'G' extent mistake of my life' and 'Ten Pretty Girls' and on 10th November, 1937, they infringed plaintiff's copyright by performing 'Hometown' 'Dinah' 'Some of these Days,' 'Will You Remember,' and 'Corny Irish Melody.'

There was no appearance for defendants. Mr Justice Johnston granted the injunction asked for with costs against defendants, and as plaintiffs did not press for damages, a writ was made so order as to damages.

## For Death of Father

### Daughter's Claim at Circuit Court

#### Decree for 20 Guineas

At Limerick Circuit Court on Friday, before Judge McElligott, K.C.,

Hannah O'Neill, Careless, Paillogreen, brought an action claiming £150 damages from Johanna Hayes, of Garrydoolin, in respect of the death of her father, Timothy Hart, who was struck by a car driven by Michael McInerney on October 19th last.

For the respondent Michael McInerney, the driver of the car, after being cautioned by the judge, said on the day in question he went to Fitzgerald's house with Mrs Hayes. He left Fitzgerald's house at about 3.15 and went to Kirby's house; he had three drinks at Kirby's during the afternoon. It was not true that he was under the influence of drink or that he was staggering. Later that evening witness took a half glass of whiskey at Hart's public house; he did not go into the public house twice; he was not staggering about before going into the public house or when he came out. Witness denied that he swerved on the road twice before going to O'Dwyer's garage. When he was leaving O'Dwyer's he did not meet any cyclist who had to dismount. Witness said he proceeded home accompanied by Mrs Hayes, Michael Meehan and Stephen Fitzgerald. At Careless Cross he saw a man about ten yards ahead of him. He staggered and he apparently struck him with the bumper.

Judge—You knew you had hit the man? Witness—Yes.

Mr Moriarty—You drove on?—Yes, Fitzgerald told me they were rough people, and that it was better not to stay.

Judge—And no wonder.

Witness—I was just pulling up after hitting the man.

Mr Moriarty—Could you have avoided hitting the man?—I do not know.

In reply to Mr Liston, the witness said the man's head went through the windscreen of the car.

Johanna Hayer, the owner of the motor car, said that she did not notice anything wrong with McInerney before the accident. This concluded the evidence.

The Judge said that in view of the fact that criminal proceedings were pending, he would say nothing that might prejudice the case. In his opinion, however, McInerney acted scandalously in failing to stop after the accident. Common humanity would have suggested that he, knowing that he had struck a man, should have done all possible to help the poor creature who was knocked down. He had no doubt whatever that if McInerney, who had only got his first driving licence fifteen days previously, had exercised the smallest degree of care, there would have been no taking of the life of a human being.

His Lordship said that in view of the fact that deceased was 83 years of age, the damages must necessarily be small. He would award 20 guineas and £7 expenses.
