#### A ROUGH CALCULATION.

Ald. Reidy said that a figure of £300,000 had been referred to as being earmarked for the hospital, but he wished to know was there anything in writing to that effect.

The Engineer said it was a rough calculation, based on the number of beds.

The Chairman said the best thing that could be done was to ascertain from the Department if 100 per cent. of the amount was forthcoming.

### Late Mrs. M. Brennan

### Huge Funeral Cortege

The death occurred on Sunday, at Meelick, Co. Clare, of Mrs. Mary Brennan, widow of Mr. Patrick Brennan and mother of Col. P. Brennan, Superintendent of the Oireachtas; Major-General Brennan, Chief of Staff; Colonel Austin Brennan, and Miss Margaret Brennan.

Mrs. Brennan was 76. She had been seriously ill for some time.

She had many exciting memories of the struggle for independence in East Clare during the Black and Tan period. Not the least of them was the arrival of a raiding party in 1920 to burn down the family homestead. Mrs. Brennan was escaping from the house in bare feet, an overcoat thrown around her shoulders, with her only daughter, Margaret, when she was seized by members of the Auxiliaries and forced to return so that she might see her home in flames.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Brennan took place to-day from Meelick Parish Church to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery. Limerick.

Requiem High Mass was celebrated this morning by Rev. J. Halpin, C.C. Parteen; deacon, Rev. Fr. Adrian, O.F.M.; sub-deacon, Rev. J. Leonard, C.C., Dromin. Rev. J Brazill, C.C., St. John's, was master of ceremonies.

### Rifects on Citizens

### Serious Threat to Community

Serious forecasts as to, the results of ing of the Concluse, specials the proposed new Re-valuation Bill on: the citizens were made at the Limerick Harbour Board yesterday, the Mayor (Ad. D. Bourke, T.D.) presiding.

A resolution was submitted for adoption from the Limerick Citizens and Ratepayers' Society making a general protest against the Bill, which, it stated, would increase rates and valuations and also electricity charges.

#### MAYOR'S OPINION.

The Mayor said that in his opinion the Re-valuation Bill was absolutely necessary and would have the effect of remedying many inequities appertaining at the present time. Many valuations were too low and others were too high. Compaints on that score had been made to him by several citizens. Mr. Quinlan-I must entirey disagree,

sir, because there can be no doubt that the object of the Bill is to raise more money for the Government. The cost of living has increased to a very alarming extent in recent years, and this increased revenue will be spent in a way that many do not desire. There also another serious aspect, and that is the effects on the worker. Specula ve house building will cease altogether, because builders will not run the risk of houses beong left on their hands, owing to high valuations. As a result there will be a big drop in the workers engaged in the building industry.

In Belfast and Waterford the people have been taught a severe lesson as to the effects of re-valuation, and I must definitely protest against it being inflicted on the citizens.

#### NO JUSTIFICATION.

Mr. Morgan McMahon said if the obect of the Bill was to bring old valuations into line with the new ones there wouldy be some justification for it, but since it was quite, obvious that that was not the object of the Bill he would have Amongst the general public were :- to protest also against its introduction.

Ald. J. Reidy, T.D., said hat many years ago an attempt was made to secure a re-valuation of Limerick. It was successfully opposed by the Citizens and Ratepayers' Society, because it was realised that the immediate result would be to increase all existing valuations. He agreed that speculative building would be seriously hit, but there was another section that would suffer heavily. They were the people who had borrowed in order to build houses under the Smll-Dwellings Acquisition Act. There was no doubt that the valuations of their buildings would be increased; and they would be heavily burdened. The Bill would mean an immediate increase in electricity charges, income tax on property, and licensed houses, and would hit every section of the community.

Mayor-As far as I can recollect the Corporation did not decide against revaluation, but only postponed the matter. Mr. Donnellan-It was thrown out on a vote.

Mr. T. J. Loughrey said that when Belfast, was re-valued the valuation went up by £1,000,000, and many traders were put out of business.

### STILL REGIET IT.

Ald. Reidy-I can tell you that the people of Waterford regretted, and still regret that they had the city re-valued.

Mr. McMahon said that when the Limerick Corporation contemplated asking for a re-valuation of the city, they were advised by the then Minister for Local Government that it would not be in the interests of the city, having regard to what had happened in Waterford.

The resolution from the Citizens' and Ratepayers' Society was adopted, on the motion of Mr. E. Holliday, secoided by Mr. Quinlan.

The Mayor dissented.

Mr. Quinlan asked if it was the intention of the Board to review the rents of its property, in view of a possible increase in the valuations.

Mr. O'Sullivan, Engineer, said the Board could review the rents at any time.

### TO PROTECT ITSELF.

Mr. Quinlan-Since the valuations are likely to go up, it would be well that the Board would take steps to protect itself. Engineer-According to the report of the Port and Harbour Authorities, our rents are generally low. It is up to the Board to revise them if it was considered

Ald. Reidy said that it would have to be remembered that one of the first effects of the Re-valuation Bill would be to increase the rates under the Unemployment Assistance Act. At the present time there was a levy of 1/6 in the £ on the present valuations, realising £8,000.
