IRISH M.P.'S DAUGHTER.

Death of Mrs. N. Carroll in London.

The death of Mrs. N. Carroll, London, was learned by old residents of Kilmallock with much regret. She was widow of Mr. Maurice J. Carroll, V.S., a native of Bruree district, who pre-deceased her by 16 years. They had resided in London since their marriage. Mrs. Carroll was daughter to the late Mr W. H. O'Sullivan, Kilmallock, who was M.P. for the Limerick constituency from 1874 to 1885. He was a prominent figure in the Home Rule movement and one of the treasurers of the Land League. He presided at a public meeting in Dublin to ascertain the feelings of the people on the obstruction policy in the House of Commons initiated by Messrs. Parnell and Biggar, and it was approved. The next meeting was held at Kilmallock. It was also attended by Mr. Parnell, and Mr. O'Sullivan presided. Mr. Parnell visited Mr. O'Sullivan at Kilmallock on different occasions, and it was from there he went to the memorable Limerick meeting about 1880, accompanied by Mr. O'Sullivan, Mr. John Dillon, M.P., and Mr. T. D. O'Sullivan, M.P. Mr. O'Sullivan was very active in connection with the Labourers Act and all questions affecting the welfare of the people. Mrs. Carroll's brother, Willie O'Sullivan, at the age of 19 years, was imprisoned in England following the rising at Kilmallock in 1867. Her demise has caused a feeling of sadness in her native town.
