The Tait Memorial piece, in its ornate architectural setting, makes no pretence to musicalness. Its harsh, metallic note grates.

not been as heretofore, the old order changeth and applies not only to the suppliers of milk but to every branch of enterprise. Happy-go-lucky methods are being discarded with a vengeance and what was looked upon as a virtue a decade ago is now an offence. People saw nothing very wrong at one time in the milk supply being hawked from door to door in an open container by a slovenly woman whose hands may not have seen soap and water for the better part of a week. She commits an offence now should she attempt anything of the kind. Everything calculated to contaminate this nutritious article of diet is punishable. No longer will it suffice to say in a case of dilution that the milk was sent to market as it came from the cow, or if carried in a dirty cart that there was no alternative. At the City District Court yesterday a number of suppliers were fined not heavily for the latter offence. It should be unnecessary to prosecute at all if the defendants had the remotest conception of cleanliness and the danger arising from contamination. Next time people are prosecuted for marketing under such unhygienic conditions the maximum penalty may be imposed.
