DEATH OF MR T. DUGGAN

We regret to announce the death of Mr. Timothy Duggan, No. 7 Alphonsus Avenue, which took place last evening He was 84 years of age and had been ailing for the past month. Mr. Duggan was not only a well-known citizen of Limerick, but he enjoyed a measure of popularity with all classes that is rare in the case of most men. Possessed of a warm-hearted kindly nature, he belonged to a generation rapidly disappearing. He was a Nationalist of the old school, and his earliest recollection of Irish politics was in connection with the famous Clare election of the eighties conducted by Mr. C. S Parnell, His occupation, that of hackney car owner, brought him into many parts of the country during the stirring days of the Home Rule movement and Land League. A life-long total abstainer, Thady Duggan was a member of St. Michael's Temperance Society since its inception, and of the hurling club thereto attached. He was an ardent follower of most kinds of sport especially hurling, Rugby football, rowing and racing. In the pre-war Horse Show days he was always a successful competitor in the hackney car class. He was a loyal member of the Arch-Confraternity of the Holy Family since established in 1868 and has now joined that glorious band that remained faithful to the end. In their bereavement the members of his family have the sympathy of the citizens.
