BOY'S TRAGIC DEATH

Drowned in Mulkear River

A boy named Denis Earls, agen nine vears, who lived at 73 Mungret Street, Limerick, was drowned in the Mulkear river, near Castletroy, on Sunday evening. It would appear that the lad, while negotiating the river by means of the city water supply pipe-line, which spans the Mulkear river, toppled in and was drowned.
