The citizens have got over the worst of the hardships of the system of poor law foisted on them. At its inception it was intimated it was only in the nature of an experiment and would be countermanded if unsuccessful. It was soon noticeable that the ratepayers had caught a tartar, as expenditure in home help commended to soar until it reached £400 weekly, and remained at that figure down virtually to the change in civic administration. A city of the population of Limerick, solely dependent for the maintenance of services on rates revenue, could not continue to meet that huge amount indefinitely on a single service. During the last four years we have got back to normal, but the position would be much more satisfactory if the pundits of the Local Government Department had kept their experiment in the archives uf the Custom House.
