POLITICAL DISTURBANCE

Quiet in Bodenstown

Country Incidents

Measures taken by the authorities to prevent any political demonstration on Sunday at Wolfe Tone's grave ni Bodenstown Churchyard, near Sallins, County Kildare proved completely effective.

Three hundred uniformed police and fifty "plain clothes men' enforced the Government's Order without difficulty. A few small parties making their way towards the grave were turned back; but there was nothing remotely approaching a mass demonstration.

A party of fully-armed soldiers and two armoured cars were rushed from Kilworth Camp to Fermoy to quell a disturbance in which several Civic Guards were injured. Quiet was restored in the town, but on Sunday night additional military forces arrived at Fermoy.

There was some excitement in Dublin M. J. Keyes, T.D; G. C Bennett, T.D. on Sunday morning when two special trains brought about a thousand people from Belfast and Northern Counties to Amiens Street Station. Twenty Civic Guards, who attempted to prevent the excursionists from forming a procession, were routed and the visitors straggled along via the quays to the General Post

At the G.P.O. speeches were made from a temporary platform, and a Union Jack was set on fire. A Press photographer was deprived of his camera. In the evening the excursionists departed from Amiens street without further in-
