Late Mr. G. Johnstone

The death, which we regret to record, took place on Sunday of Mr. George Johnstone, at his residence, Kirriemuir, North Circular Road, after a short iliness. He was in middle life, and was for the last 30 years on the clerical staff of Messrs. J. Matterson & Sons, Ltd. Mr. Johnstone was a son of the late Mr. Peter Johnstone, Blackwater, and Sarsfield Street, one of the best known Veterinary Surgeons in North Munster, and an authority on bloodstock. Deceased had a long connection with L.P.Y.M.A., of which he was an active member. His death is a severe blow to his widow, for whom there is deep sympathy.

The funeral took place to St. Munchin's Cemetery this morning, after a Service in the Presbyterian Church, conducted by Rev. W. M. Cargin, M.A., who also said the commital prayers at the graveside.

The remains had lain overnight in the church, whither they had been removed on Monday evening, accompanied by friends, and business associates.
