WINTER WHEAT

As a result of the recent improve-
ment in weather conditions, farmers in
every part of the country are busy get-
ting the land ready for winter wheat
and in the sowing of the crop. For those
who intend to sow wheat there is much
to be said in favour of winter varieties;
and should the present favourable
weather conditions continue, there is
still time to get in a large area of the
crop. But there is no time to lose, and
every day counts.

Farmers who have winter wheat seed
on hands or who can still procure seed
are urged to get it sown with as little
delay as possible so as not to miss what
may perhaps be the last favourable op-
portunity of the season for doing so.

Whether to sow winter wheat within
the next week or ten days or whether
to sow spring wheat later on is in all
probability a question agitating the
minds of many farmers at the moment.
There should be no hesitation whatever
as to which course to pursue. Growers
in a position to do so should take imme-
diate steps to sow winter wheat.
