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**NOTED LIMERICK PRIEST**

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**Dies in Australia**

News was received in Limerick yester-  
day announcing the death of Rev. M.  
McNamara, P.P., of North Parramatta,  
Australia He was brother of Mr Thomas  
McNamara, Clondrinagh, Limerick; Mrs.  
Dens O'Donovan, late of Castleconnell,  
and of the late Mr. John McNamara,  
Shelbourne, Limerick.

Father McNamara, as a young student,  
left for Australia in 1875, and on his  
arrival in Sydney he was greeted by the  
late Most Rev. Dr. Polding, Australia's  
first Bishop.

Sixty-four years ago Dr. Matthew  
Quin, Bishop of Bathurst, visited Ireland  
for the purpose of getting young men to  
supplement his meagre band of priests.  
Two Limerick ecclesiastical students  
answered the call, one of them being the  
late Father McNamara. Having com-  
pleted his studies, the young student was  
ordained in 1880. He spent the greater  
part of his priestly life in the Arch-  
diocese of Sydney, and by his wonderful  
zeal and energy he succeeded in founding  
many parishes.
