

ated that he had been disemployed. Plaintiff stated that he was employed at £28 10s for six months, but he later amended his statement and stated that he was maintained by defendant, who gave him a few shillings now and then.

Speaking from the body of the court at this stage, plaintiff intervened, and said—"I didn't know you were an inspector at all.

His Lordship gave a decree for £15, and said that while plaintiff may not have been permanent with defendant he did all kinds of work on the holding, and was entitled to something for the help and assistance he had given.

Judge E. McElligott, K.C., opened and concluded the business of the Easter term of the Rathkeale Circuit Court on Wednesday.

Wm. Quaid, farmer, Ballykenedy, Ballingarry, appealed against the decision of District Justice Kenny at Rathkeale District Court in awarding a decree for £14 9s 4d to Mary Roche, servant girl, Fanlehane, Newcastle West, allowance of wages alleged to be due as a result of the alleged breach of hiring agreement by defendant.

Mr. M. Danaher, B.L. (instructed by Messrs. R. Cussen, LL.D., solicitor, Newcastle West), appeared for plaintiff (respondent) and the defendant (appellant) was represented by Mr. Roche, B.L. (instructed by Messrs Connolly and Co., solicitors, Limerick.)

Respondent's case was that in 1937 she was employed by appellant as a servant girl to work on his farm and that she was dismissed without proper reason or notice. As a result she claimed balance of wages alleged to be due and was in the District Court awarded a decree for £1 9s 4d.

For the appellant it was claimed that respondent left her employment of her own wish and that she had never given satisfaction to the appellant.

Having heard the evidence his Lordship reversed the decision of the District Court on the grounds that the hiring contract was indivisible and that the custom of giving a month's notice as claimed by respondent did not hold in law. He made no order in regard to the question of costs.

NEW AGREEMENT

Anglo-Turkish Conversation

It was announced to-day that an agreement had been reached between Great Britain and Turkey for the greater protection of the Mediterranean.
