DEATH OF ESTEEMED CITIZEN.

Mr. W. G. Peacocke.

It is with feelings of sincere regret we announce the death of Mr. William George Peacocke, which took place at his residence, Southville, South Circular Road, Limerick, this morning. He had since before Christmas, and been ill during the past month his condition grew worse, and the end came with calm resignation. Mr. Peacocke was a member of an old and respected Limerick family prominently associated with the mercantile and public life of the city. He received his education at Crescenet College, and was for some years on the commercial staff of the "Irish Independent," Dublin, while controlled by the Parnellite Party. On the death of his mother he returned home to take over the hardware, oil and colour stores in William Street. Under his direction the 73 m.p.h., and the business rapidly expanded, consequenet on his aptitude and the employment of progressive methods of salesmanship. Mr Peacocke was elected a member of the Corporation in 1905 for the Market Ward, which he represented during the succeeding six years. While on that body he made a useful contribution to civic adminitration. He was a Justice of the Peace for the City and a Grand Juror. When not occupied at his business ,and outside the sanctuary of his own home, Willie Peacocke found the greatest en-
