Brother and Sister Die

## Within A Few Hours Of One Another

Doctor's Evidence At Inquest

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The sad deaths of two children at Punchbown, Meelick. county Clare, was investigated by Dr J Scanlan, coroner, and a jury,

at Meelick on Monday afternoon.

The children—Thomas Galvin, aged 7, and Bernadette Galvin, aged 5 years—died on Sanday within a few hours of each other

after having bern ill only a few days.

Their father is Thomas Galvin, who works
at a van man in a Limerick bakery, and has
a small holding at Meelick; he has four
other children.

Prior to the inquest a post mortem examination of the bodies was carried out by
Dr Clobessy, House Surgeon, Barrington's
Hospital, Limerick, and Dr J Power, Sixmilebridge.
The coroner said the occurrence was very

sid and was most unusual in his long experience. Both children had died within a few hours of each other.

Thomas Galvin, father, stated that when

Thomas Gslvin, father, stated that when he came home from work on Saturday night his wife informed him that Thomas was ill and in bed. Bernardette had been com-

plaining of a headache and was in bed since the previous day.

Answering Sergt T Dolan, Ardnacrusha, the father said that on Sunday moroing the boy was much worse and he went for a

boy was much worse and he went for a doctor. When the doctor came he was sent for a priest, and while he was gone the girl died. The boy died at 10 o'clock the same evening.

Sergt Dolan—While the children were ill what kind of courishment were they given?

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-Milk diluted with water and a small quantity of whiskey.

Were they healthy children?—They were never sick and had been at school up to Thursday.

Dr Clobersy stated he performed a post mortem examination on both boils with

Dr Power. There was a quantity of pues around the buy's heart and was probably the result of a cold. This is flamation was the cause of death. The girl had inflamation of the kidneye, but otherwise was perfectly sound. In both cases death was due to natural causes.

Mr Nix, foreman of the jury, asked was there any danger of other children in the

district being infected

Dr Clohesy.—There is no danger of infection and no need for any special procautions.

The doctor added that he had taken some of the puss for further examination.

This concluded the evidence, and the jury returned a verdict in accordance with the medical testimony.
