DUBLIN CATTLE MARKET.

Dublin, Thursday — Number of cattle, 1,096; sheep and lambs, 6,559. Cattle supplies further reduced, but with buyers in a cautious mood sales throughout proved of a slow and weaker nature, especially heavy shipping types of bullocks, which failed to clear except at prices which were much under owners ideas of values. Best bullocks and heifers, 59/- to 60/-; fancy drafts of latter, 62/-; secondary and rougher classes, 50/- to 58/- per live cwt. Sheep and lambs more plentiful, but with little export trade the market proved a slow and cheaper one and failed to clear at — Mutton, 7d. to 1/1 per lb.; and lambs, 24/- to 45/- per head.

WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, May 29th — Cattle — Decrease in numbers in both sections of the market, but more beef. Nice quality medium weight heifers and bullocks were readily cashed and wanted. Fresh young cows easily placed; full current values ruled. Practically all beef lots cleared. The store cattle section comprised principally small two year olds and yearlings, and included some useful drafts of well-bred feeders, for which there was steady demand. Yearlings a smaller show; nicely bred yearlings with colour met active enquiry and a ready sale; top rates. Over the day's proceedings there was steady selling trade and satisfactory clearance. Fat heifers, best £20 5s. to £26; second run, £14 to £18 15s.; cows, best, £21 10s. to £25 10s.; second run, £12 to £17 15s.; two year old bullocks and heifers, £10 2s. 6d. to £16 5s.; yearlings, best, £11 to £13 7s.; second run, £8 to £10 5s.

Sheep — Shorter numbers; mixed class. Full attendance of buyers. Trade opened quiet, vendors unwilling at first to accept current rates, but soon settled down and worked out smoothly and buyers operated freely. Prices up to the basis of this day week. Useful hoggets enquired for and in demand; well-fed sheep met a ready exchange. Less store sheep; demand quiet. Well-fed lambs scarce. Market fairly well cleared. Fat middle weight, 85s. to 95s.; second run, 75s. to 84s.; hoggets, fat, 75s. to 85s.; second run, 58s. to 69s.; stores, best, 50s. to 57s. 6d.; second run, 38s. to 49s.; ewes, best, 65s. to 75s.; second run, 49s. to 60s.; lambs, 33s. to 46s. — Wm. 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
