The total sum payable by the occupier of any Agricultural Land in respect of the above be reduced by the application of the Agricultural Grant.

The Agricultural Grant for the year March, 1941, amounts to £109,266, and is apporti tion of £399,471, being the total valuation of the Agricultural Land in the County assessable as follows:—

PRIMARY ALLOWANCE.—The total sum payable in respect of Poor Rate by the occupier of Land, the rateable valuation of which does not exceed £20, will be reduced by a sum equal to the £ on said land. A similar allowance will be made on the first £20 of Agricultural Land of £20 valuation.

EMPLOYMENT ALLOWANCE.—On the part of the valuation of Agricultural Land a valuation relief at the rate of 6/6½ in the £ will be given on the amount by which the valuation in respect of employment of male persons (17 to 70 years of age) in the period 1st January, 1939, and subject to the limitation that the valuation on which such relief is calculated exceeds £12 10s. 0d. for each adult workman as set out in Section (7) of the Rates on Relief Act, 1935.

SUPPLEMENTARY ALLOWANCE.—After the Primary and Employment Allowances have been obtained and deducted from the County share of the Agricultural Grant the balance of the Grant in relief at the rate of 3/5 in the £ in accordance with the terms prescribed by Section 8 of the Rates on Relief Act, 1935.

The Rate Books are now in my custody and may be inspected by any person affected at the County Council Offices between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m., exclusive of Sundays and public holidays. The said Rates will be payable from and after the publication of this notice.

It is not so long ago since there were a number of people who were not aware of the existence of a turf bog on the peak of Corrin Mountain, and when it was suggested that it would be a good thing to divide it into suitable turbary lots there were many who threw ridicule on the project and would give no help in what they called a foolish agitation. Dreams sometimes come true and now there are over 100 turbary holders, each of whom has collected enough of the precious fuel to hold out for a whole year.
