BODY RECOVERED FROM SHANNON

A verdict of "found drowned" was returned at an inquest held at the County Courthouse, Limerick, to-day, by Dr. P. Clery, Coroner for East Limerick, on Michael Carrick (65), whose body was recovered from the river Shannon at Barrington's Pier on Satur- day. The deceased was an ex- New Zealand soldier, who lived alone in lodging at Davis Street. He was a native of Ennis, and had been missing for some days.

There was no money found on the body but it is believed that the deceased was in comfortable circumstances and the Gardai are carrying out a search for deposit receipts.
