## LATE MR. T. COLBERT, HARBOUR VIEW TERRACE, LIMERICK.

The funeral of the late Mr. Thomas Colbert, Harbour View Terrace, Limerick, took place from St. Michael's Church to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery on November 10th. The deceased gentleman, who had been an official of the G.P.O. for 47 years, was well known and highly respected in the city. He was a member of the Arch-Confraternity since its foundation 72 years ago. He was father of the late Rev. Father T. Colbert, St. Munchin's College.

## MR. JOSEPH A. BUCKLEY.

The entire parish of Banagher mourn the death of Mr. Joseph A. Buckley, which took place with unexpected suddenness, at Barrington's Hospital, Limerick, on the 19th October. For many years Mr. Buckley was engineer for Messrs. James Bannatyne and Sons, Ltd., on the ss. Steamer from Limerick by Killaloe to Lough Derg, and was afterwards transferred to the engineering department of Mount Kennett, Limerick. During the troubled times he did great work for Sinn Fein. He had an engaging manner, which endeared him to a wide circle of friends. He was held in the highest esteem by all, particularly those in Clare and Killaloe.

He was married to a Clare lady, the daughter of the late Ignatius McInerney, Derrynaveigh, Oatfield. He was brother of the late John Buckley, O.S., Land Registry Office, Dublin, also of Mr. Patrick Buckley, late of Guinness's, Dublin, and of Mr. Peter, Buckley, Banagher.

The removal of the remains from St. Michael's Church to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery brought forth a striking manifestation of sorrow, and the sympathies of the entire community go to the bereaved widow and relatives on their irreparable loss.
