DEATH OF MR. O. D. COLL

The death occurred yesterday in St.
John's Hospital, Limerick, of Mr. Owen
D. Coll, accounts clerk, Limerick County
D. Coll, accountant's clerk, Limerick Co.
Council.

The passing of this highly-esteemed
and popular figure will come as a
shock to all who knew him, not only in
Limerick, but in all parts of Ireland, for
the deceased was, some years ago, a
well-known figure in the athletic arena
all over the country. He was son of the
late Mr. Pat Coll, who was clerk of the
old Kilmallock Union for many years,
and over thirty years ago the deceased
was appointed on the staff of Limerick
County Council.

The late Mr. Coll was one of the best
athletes Ireland ever produced, and if
he had been given the opportunity there
need be no doubt that he would have
won international fame. He held the
Championship of Munster for the 100
yards, 220 and 440, while in other field
events he also distinguished himself. In
private life Owen Coll had hosts of
friends, and as a recreant he had few
equals. He was very popular and his
premature demise, following an opera-
tion, will come as a shock to an ex-
tremely wide circle of friends and ac-
quaintances. He leaves a wife and seven
children to mourn his loss, and we join
with the general public in extending
heartfelt sympathy to them.

The remains will be removed at 8
o'clock this evening to St. John's
Cathedral.

The funeral will take place at 1
o'clock on Sunday to Dromin via Cronin
and Bruree.
