Girl Rescued in Shannon.
There was a thrilling rescue in Shannon at Killaloe on Friday last following a mishap to a boating party. Mr. Dick Carrickford (Carrickford Dramatic Co.) by Mr. Paddy Doyle and Doreen and Sheila Doyle Dramatic Co., left the pier in a small rowing boat at about 10 p.m. and passed under the Killaloe bridge when a little below the mill. Doreen Doyle stood up in the boat to get a view of a house boat and the boat tilted and Doreen was overboard. As she was falling her brother's coat and pullover. Paddy, who was a swimmer was unable to give assistance to his sister and she was in great difficulty in coming ashore. D. Doyle was sinking for some time when Dick Carrickford grasped him by the neck and dived in to save her. He tried to extricate her but could not until she became in his arms, when he, after great effort succeeded in bringing her to the shore. Respiration was applied by Paddy and a few minutes she regained consciousness.

Gave Great Assistance.
Messrs. Gibbons, Waterstone and Co. had arrived by this time to give great assistance. They came over the wall and did everything to calm and comfort her. The shore Paddy Doyle got the boat and went in pursuit of Sheila who was drifting down the Shannon. Sheila knew nothing and was on the eve of being overtaken and brought safely ashore.

40 Feet of Water.
