

# POPULAR LIMERICK MAN

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## DIES IN MONKSTOWN

In Monkstown Hospital, County Dub-  
lin, to the inexpressible grief of his rela-  
tives, Mr. John Joe Cosgrave, late head  
waiter of the Royal Irish Yacht Club,  
Dunleary, died rather suddenly on Mon-  
day morning. The remains arrived in  
Limerick by motor hearse on Tuesday,  
and the funeral took place at 3 p.m. to  
Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery. The  
funeral cortege was large and represen-  
tative. Deceased was one of the most  
popular and kind hearted of men, and  
proved a valuable friend in need to any  
Limerick man who required his assist-  
ance in the Metropolis. He rendered  
valuable service in the fight for National  
Independence as did also his brother,  
Mathew.

The members of the Royal Irish Yacht  
Club gave every help and assistance to  
the relatives when taking over the re-  
mains, and their great kindness and sym-  
pathy as well as the helpfulness of Mr.  
Taylor, Secretary, and members of the  
staff, were keenly appreciated.

Mayor of Limerick, in 1921, and displayed  
amazing courage on the occasion. Her

herself by her kindly and charitable dis-  
position. Much sympathy will be felt for  
her daughter, Mrs. Clancy, in her bereave-  
ment.

The remains will be removed from  
"Dun Guir," North Circular Road, this  
(Friday) evening at 8.30. There will  
be solemn Requiem Mass at St. Munchin's  
Church at 11 a.m. to-morrow (Saturday),  
and the funeral will take place to Mount  
St. Lawrence at 12 noon.
