It appears that deceased had been granted a half day to attend to some private business, and cycled down the path from the workmen's yard to the main avenue on his way out. At the junction of the pathway and avenue, near the familiar well, he collided with Mrs Gubbin's motor car, Mrs. Gubbins being on her way home at the time.
