## FATAL COLLISION

### In East Limerick

#### YOUNG MAN KILLED

Tragedy (writes our Hospital corres-pondent) cast its grim and gloomy shadow over the district during the week-end, when a young man, William Crowley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Crowley, Ballinaveen, Emly, and an employee on the Gubbins Estate, Kilfrush, met his death in distressingly sad circumstances.

It appears that deceased had been gran- ted a half day to attend to some private business, and cycled down the path from the workmen's yard to the main avenue on his way out. At the junction of the pathway and avenue, near the familiar well, he collided with Mrs Gubbin's motor car, Mrs. Gubbins being on her way home at the time.

#### SUCCUMBED IN SHORT TIME.

Medical and spiritual aid were quickly procured, but the unfortunate man had received terrible injuries to his head, and succumbed after a short time.

His remains were removed to St. Ailbe's Church, Emly, on Saturday evening, the interment taking place on Sunday in the adjoining cemetery.

The deceased young man was a particu- larly fine type of Irish peasant, a faithful and diligent worker, attached to home and to the innocent pursuits which sweeten life in rural areas. Gay-hearted, cheery and of a most likeable disposition, there were few young men in his parish so popular as he.

#### A GREAT GAEL.

His prowess in the football field, and his great popularity with his fellows automatically caused him to be selected as captain of the Emly Football Club, and his club-mates formed a guard of honour for his remains as they lay in the beautiful Church of Ailbe's ancient city. Large numbers of the general public from Hospital, Emly and Knock-long were present at the obsequies, a manifestation of the deep regret felt in the district at the young man's tragic and untimely end.
