EXPENDITURE AND ESTIMATED REVENUE.

The Manager said that he was very much in favour of having public baths provided in the city, but his concern was one of finance. He was not prepared to ask the ratepayers to bear a burden under present c reumstances for a project of this kind. He did not know what grant would be given by the State for a public swimming baths, but assuming that the maximum grant were given, 40 per cent, the repayment of the loan charges would amount to £2,000 per year. The estimated: revenue from the baths, according to the deputation, would be only £900 per year and, consequently, the rates would have to meet a charge of £1,100. He was not prepared to ask the ratepayers to meet.

It was stated that some local quarries are left unworked whilst material was brought long distances by lorries. This not only deprives the carters, but also the workers of the chance of earning a little money.
