The funeral which took place, sub-

that would be made available for the
swimming baths could not be got for
housing.

Mr. Casey said that it should be possible
to utilise the baths for some amusements,
in order to bring in extra money. In
England and other places public baths
were commercialised, with the result that
they were paying concerns.

EXPENDITURE AND ESTIMATED REVENUE.

The Manager said that he was very
much in favour of having public baths
provided in the city, but his concern was
one of finance. He was not prepared to
ask the ratepayers to bear a burden under
present circumstances for a project of
this kind. He did not know what grant
would be given by the State for a public
swimming baths, but assuming that the
maximum grant were given, 40 per cent.,
the repayment of the loan charges would
amount to £2,000 per year. The estimated
revenue from the baths, according to the
deputation, would be only £900 per year
and, consequently, the rates would have
to meet a charge of £1,100. He was not
prepared to ask the ratepayers to meet
that burden at the present time.

With regard to the question of labour
on the baths, he had satisfied himself
that only £8,000 of the total expenditure
would go in wages. It occurred to him
that the present was not an opportune
time to undertake a project of this kind,
when the cost of fittings had gone up
enormously. This scheme should have
been initiated seven or eight years ago.
He would go into the whole question very
carefully and if he found that the scheme
could be undertaken without adding to
the rate charge he would carry it out.

ATTITUDE OF SWIMMING CLUBS.

Mr. Michael O'Malley (a member of
the deputation) said he had little doubt
that the baths would be a paying pro-
position. So far as the swimming clubs
were concerned they would do all they
could to facilitate the City Manager.

Manager—I know the swimming clubs
will give all the co-operation possible.

The Mayor said that when the
Manager had gone into the question of
finance, after having ascertained what
grant would be made available, the
deputation would be acquainted.

Dr. Cowper having thanked the Council,
the deputation withdrew.

IRISH LABOUR PARTY

At a meeting of Caherconlish Branch
of the Irish Labour Party on Sunday,
8th inst., Mr. Edward Daly presiding.

Several members protested strongly
against the action of the County Council
in suspending all road work in the dis-
trict. It was hoped that some extra
work would be given for Christmas, but
the workers have been disappointed,
moreover, as a promise was given by the
Council to the Labour Party to give
more work, instead of giving an increase
in wages to the road workers. However,
it is hoped that some form of relief work
may be started in the district in the near
future.

In the carters' section a complaint was
made that the County Council were using
lorries to convey road material whilst
carters are being left idle. This is most
unfair to those poor men, who have to
meet the increased cost of the upkeep
of a horse, not to mention the increased
cost of living. It was stated that some
local quarries are left unworked whilst
material was brought long distances by
lorries. This not only deprives the car-
ters, but also the workers of the chance
of earning a little money.
