TRIBUTES IN COURT

TO LATE MR. R. CUSSEN, SOLICITOR

Glowing tributes to the late Mr. R. Cussen, solicitor, were paid at Newcastle West District Court on Friday 11th inst., the adjudicating Justice being Mr. T. G. O'Sullivan, B.L.

At the outset of the proceedings, the Justice said that since he was last in Newcastle West—since the last Court, in fact—the legal profession and people of the county had suffered a great loss by the death of Mr. Robert Cussen, who for the past fifty years had been a solicitor not only of outstanding ability but of outstanding integrity. The late Mr. Cussen, added the Justice, was also a great sportsman, and as long as the Irish Cup was run at Clounanna he would be remembered. He would like to offer his sincere sympathy to the bereaved family and relatives.

Mr. M. F. Noonan, solr. (Messrs. P. T. Liston & Co., solicitors, Rathkeale), speaking as senior member of the legal profession present, said that it was his very sad duty to join with the Justice in tendering to the bereaved family his very sincere sympathy. The late Mr. Cussen was an outstanding member of the profession, a white man if ever there was a white man, and he could speak for well-nigh thirty years experience in a business capacity with him. He always found him a gentleman to his very finger tips; his word was his bond, and it was a pleasure for him as well as for everybody else to do business with him. Mr. Cussen was one of the best known sportsmen in the country and was widely known as such. He was a landmark in the town of Newcastle West and district and he would be missed not alone by his family but by the general public for many a day. He (Mr. Noonan) personally had lost a great friend, and all he could say in conclusion was, 'May his soul rest in peace.'
