CHARGE OF STEALING BACON

At a special Court in Adare on Saturday, before District Justice Kenny, B.L., Patrick Mulcahy, of no fixed abode, was charged that on the 25th November, at Smithfield, Croagh, he broke and entered the dwellinghouse of John T. Lowe and stole bacon to the value of 1/-.

Supt. Cooney, prosecuted and defendant was not professionally represented.

Sergeant Keegan said that he arrested the defendant and charged him with the offence set out. He also cautioned the defendant who replied: "I will make no statement." Witness was still continuing enquiries into the case and he consequently asked for a remand in custody to the next Court in Ballyneety.

The Justice said that he would remand the defendant in custody to Ballyneety Court on Thursday next. If enquiries had not been completed by that date a further remand could be granted.
