Cattle prices under average for the season with a good and business-like attendance of buyers, sales proved sharper, an occasional advance in values at best bullocks and heifers, 52/6 to 54/-; good secondary sorts, 50/- to 56/-; rougher, 47/- to 49/- per live cwt. Sheep and lambs met an improved demand from opening, with the choicest lots placed to better advantage. Prices for a freer sale inside previous terms. Mutton, 10d. to 11d.; secondary quality, 8½d. to 9½d.; rougher, 5d. to 7½d. per lb., and lambs, 24/- to 45/- per head.

WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Dublin, Wednesday, July 3rd: Cattle—Smaller than last week, fair average class; good attendance. Bullock and heifer beef short supply, well done lots easily sold. A greater number of cows; fresh young cows wanted, readily placed, full rates, and firm demand. Beef lots all cleared; more could have been sold. Short supply of store cattle; trade dull; the tone of business in this section wore a quiet and unceremonious aspect; those cashed were at lower prices. Fat heifers, £19 5s. to £21 5s.; best, £18 5s. to £22 5s.; second run, £17 to £17 10s.; yearlings, £18 to £19 7s. 6d.

Sheep—Substantial increase, nearly all filled; all round a better class than last day week and more good mutton. Attendance of buyers. Trade opened briskly but soon settled down and worked smoothly, buyers operating freely. Well fed sheep met a ready exchange; about on the basis of last week. Good well fed hoggets wanted and readily cashed, also prime wethers. Fresh ewes bid for, but heavy ewes failed to clear. Fat lambs were in good demand at last week's rates. Trade well supported; an early finish and satisfactory clearance.
