PIGS AND BACON COMMISSION

A Representative of the Commission will accept from producers Pigs of bacon weight delivered in a healthy condition. Pigs will be exported on behalf of producers. Payment of a sum not exceeding £4 in respect of any one pig will be made to producers, as soon as possible after acceptance of such pig. The balance of the price will be returned to producers as soon as payment from the British market is received.

In the export of pigs on behalf of producers, the Commission will act as their agents. The price to be returned to the producers for such pigs will be that obtained on the export market, after deduction of necessary expenses (including Insurance) incurred in the export.

Producers are specially asked not to export pigs weighing less than C 2-0-7 live weight, or C 1-2-3 dead weight.
