DUBLIN CATTLE MARKET.
 Dublin Thursday. Number of cattle, 892; sheep and lambs, 6,807. Cattle supplies small with quality only moderate. Buyers in good attendance and businesslike mood for suitable quality at former rates, otherwise values remained about steady, with fewer numbers to deal with. The market sold up early, at Best bullocks, 53/- to 55/-; extra, 57/- to 58/-; heifers, 51/6 to 53/6; secondary and rougher classes, 46/- to 50/- per cwt. Sheep of best quality steady, but lambs and rough sheep weaker, and large numbers unsold, at 10d. (prime), 10d. to 10½d.; secondary and rougher, 5d. to 9d. per lb. and lambs, 23/- to 47/- each.

WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, August 7th. Entry above seasonable numbers, including some useful drafts of stores, beef a fair supply and in strong demand, firm trade for fat and conditioned cattle at full values, especially heifers; young heiferish cows selling well; older beef cows lower rates. Home buyers present for forward feeders (which were scarce), also young stores; purchasers more ready to invest, with a strengthening in values all round but aspect and good clearance. Fat heifers, best, £19 10s. to £24; second run, £15 to £19; fat cows, best, £19 5s. to £24; second run, £19 15s. to £14 10s.; two-year old bullocks and heifers, £13 10s. to £15; one-and-a-half-year-olds, best, £12 to £14 5s.; second run, £7 17s. 6d. to £11 10s.

Sheep—Full average supply, a fairly useful turn out; prime sheep met satisfactory demand with firm trade, previous rates repeated anything with condition and quality had buyers; young ewes freely bid for; fat lambs came in for strong attention, useful thick sorts with quality bid for and sold. All round inquiry fairly well sustained with a healthy tone. Good support for useful well-fed sheep. Proceedings over the day finished up well, the bulk of the useful sheep sold. Usual attendance. 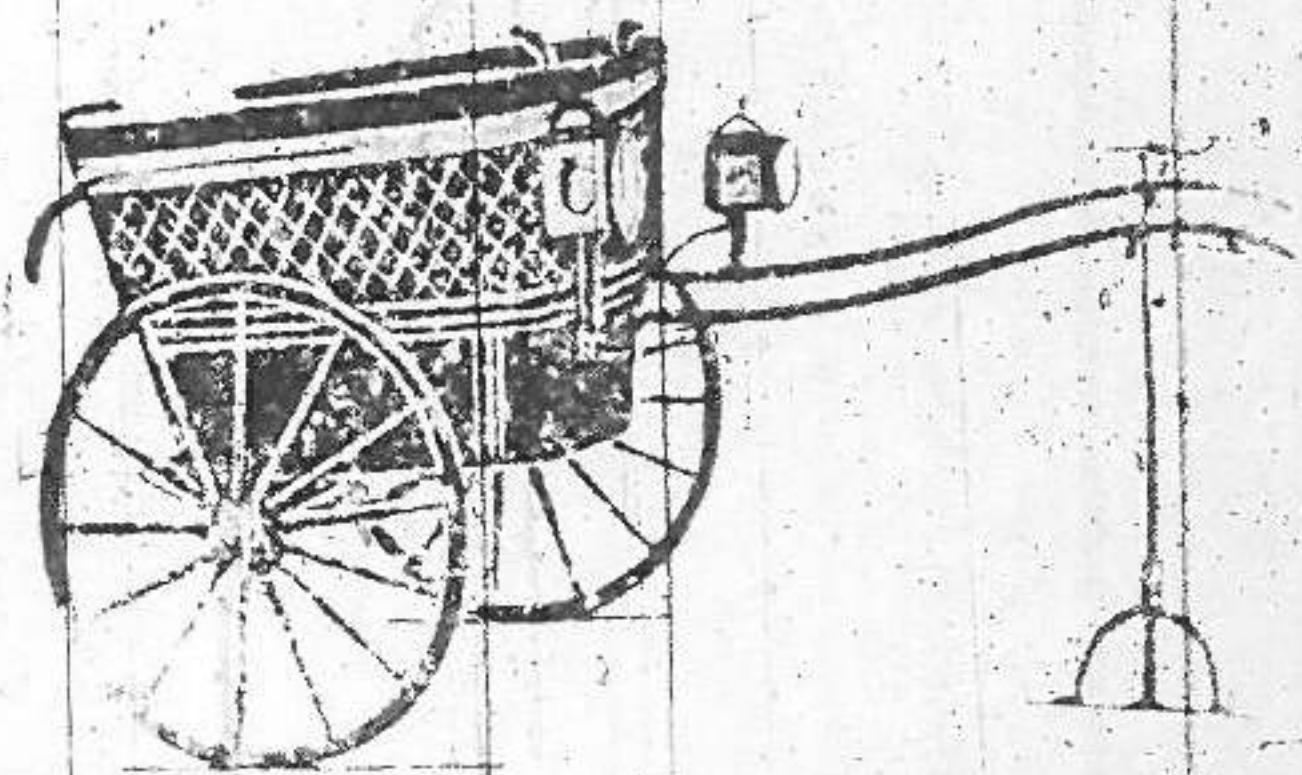
