 Dublin, Thursday—Moderate supply and export trade for good quality cows and heifers fairly active with late rates well maintained. Ordinary and plainer classes in quiet request, but owing to lighter supply there was fair clearance. Best cows, each, £25, £32; heifers, £25, £30; seconds, £21, £24; others, £15, £20. Store cattle—Supplies light, about 900. Owing to shortage of grass, demand disappointing; prices again lower. Best cattle, 42/-, 45/-; secondary and younger, 38/-, 41/- cwt.

Sheep—Supply heavier and included greater proportion of heavy sheep; trade slower at easier rates. Ewes, especially secondary sorts, quiet support, values in buyers' favour. Lamb supplies dwindling but sufficient for requirements. Prime wether mutton, lb., 10d., 10 1/2d.; secondary, 8d., 9d.; best ewes, 6d., 7d.; others around 6d.; lambs, each, 25/-, 50/-.

**WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.**  
 Wednesday, September 11th: Cattle—Much larger entry, which included some nice handy weight beef heifers and bullocks, also a good show of young stores. Beef met a fair selling trade at current rates; fresh heiferish cows readily placed, oldish and rough sorts, not in demand. All classes of store cattle, except nice colour heifers, met a slower trade and dull demand. The backward condition of pastures is having its effect on trade. Nice one and a half year old heifers in strong demand and sold well; otherwise a quiet and somewhat depressed atmosphere was evident. Full attendance of buyers. Fat heifers, small, £16 10s. to £18 10s.; cows, best, £17 to £20; second run, £12 to £16 15s.; two and a half year old bullocks, small, £16 15s.; one and a half year old heifers, £13 to £14 5s.; second run, £10 10s. to £10 13s.; bullocks, £10 14s. to £14 7s. 6d.; second run, £8 10s. to £10.

Sheep—The supplementary sheep sale. This annual fixture was also held to-day, with a full average entry. There was a good attendance of buyers and a fair show of fat and store sheep; small supply of breeding ewes and rams. In the fat section trade was steady, and nice well fed middle weights met good demand at late rates. All useful and saleable sheep easily cashed; secondary and half done pens hard to negotiate. Ewes a steady trade. Fat lambs met a brisk and firm trade and were all cashed. Store lambs of the right class sold at recent rates; backward and thin lambs difficult to place. Over the day's proceedings there was a firm demand for all classes of sheep. Good clearance effected. Fat middle weight, 64s. to 79s.; small, 52s. 6d. to 62s.; breeding ewes, 50s. to 57s. 6d.; draft ewes, 57s. 6d. to 74s.; fat lambs, best, 42s. to 57s. 6d.; stores, 35s. to 40s.; ram lambs, 35s. to 57s.
