

DUBLIN CATTLE MARKET.  
Dublin, Thursday—Number of cattle, 2,090; sheep and lambs, 5,727. Cattle in small supply for the season, with quality only moderate. Local buyers were early bidders for the choicer light to medium weight beasts at firmer rates. Good heavy bullocks also satisfactorily placed to exporters, and with smaller numbers of the rougher element to deal with, the market cleared fairly early at—Best bullocks and heifers, 48/- to 51/-; fancy drafts of latter up to 53/-; secondary and rougher, 41/- to 46/6 per live cwt. Mutton in demand and cleared early at firmer rates. Mutton, 7d. to 11d. per lb., and lambs, 28/- to 58/- each, according to quality.

THE PADDOCKS, LIMERICK.  
**ANNUAL CHRISTMAS MARKET AND WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.**  
Wednesday, December 18th—Cattle—The entry in the cattle section was of larger dimensions than recent markets, and as heavy as the Christmas market this time twelve months. There was a big attendance and full muster of buyers. In the cattle section more beef of a useful class; suitable heifers and bullocks readily placed. Young fresh well-bred cows freely bid for and cashed; strong forward bullocks met firm trade and easily changed hands. The turn out of young stores well up to the description of last week; brisk demand and sale; a number of stores of the right stamp found buyers at top rates. Strong inquiry for dairy heifers. Value position continues steady. N.c.e calves met inquiry and sale; a good average all round trade, with a heavy turn-over on the day's transactions. Market well cleared. Fat heifers and bullocks, £19 to £24; second run, £14 10s. to £18 15s.; fat cows, £16 10s. to £18; second run, £10 to £16 5s.; 2 1/2 year old bullocks, £15 15s. to £18; 1 1/2 year olds, best, £11 10s. to £14 2s. 6d.; second run, £9 10s. to £12 6d.; calves, best, £7 5s. to £9 3s.; second run, £4 1s. to £7 2s.  
Sheep—Heaviest entry of the year, 934 penned. A fine turn-out of tip-top sheep. Buyers showed a favourable business disposition for saleable lots, but owing to the extra heavy supply trade was not as active as last week and previous full rates were not repeated. Hoggets of nice quality and well fed met steady exchange on satisfactory terms; good small sheep were in favour. Young ewes in good condition sold readily. Some top fat lambs shown and cashed. Market well cleared with a steady finish. The general position showed stability and a steady demand, ample requirements to absorb all good cattle and sheep. A good selling trade experienced; one of the best markets of the year and a heavy volume of business transacted. Hoggets, best, 68/- to 77/-; second run, 60/- to 67/6; small, 45/- to 58/-; ewes, best, 56/- to 70/-; second run, 45/- to 55/-; lambs, best, 47/6 to 58/-; second run, 40/- to 47/-; stores, 30/- to 40/-—Wm. B. Fitt & Co. Auctioneers.

THE PADDOCKS, LIMERICK.  
**WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET.**  
Tuesday, December 17th—The entry at to-day's market showed a substantial increase, being the heaviest of the season and comprising a fairly good average class, with some choice cows on sale. The attendance was large and representative; weather conditions most favourable. Trade opened on quiet lines, buyers wanting concession in rates, especially for the choice lots, but where vendors showed "give and take," sales were effected, prices showing a drop on recent high rates.
