

ROWING NOTES

Good Crews.

The crews of Shannon (senior eight, senior four), stroked by Seamus Smith, are really good and continue to make improvement in speed. In the Head of the River race on 8th inst. Shannon seniors gave a handicap of 65 seconds and finished seven seconds behind the winning Athlunkard maiden crew. The latter are a hefty lot, and are expected to do well this year, so that a senior crew capable of giving almost a full minute to a much thought of maiden one must be reckoned to be worth nursing. The men in the boats in senior classes are in earnest in their work, and should be hard to beat when completely finished training. The long swing is exceedingly useful when in the lead in a race, and that occasional "dozen," when opponents are creeping up, has a heart-breaking effect. The junior eight and four are also doing well. Would it help both seniors and juniors if trial spins were held occasionally on the handicap basis? Such procedure suggests itself as the most practical method of training when a club can boast good crews in both classes, and it may be that positional changes in one or other of the crews would prove of advantage. The maidens of Shannon are a collection of most, if not all, this year's material, and so far have not attained that competency which would warrant too optimistic hopes. However, there is good material in their ranks which, with constant coaching, should uphold the tradition of S.R.C. Senior and junior scullers will spot the blue and white this year.

Limerick B.C.

If consistent training counts for anything the men of L.B.C. will be well in the picture this year. Willie Green's senior four goes with pendulum like accuracy, the men catching and finishing in improved fashion. Any obvious defect that predominated has evidently been corrected and the crew may now go "full steam ahead" to attaining the maximum of speed. Joe Hall is giving a beautiful stroke to the maiden eight. This crew is well worth taking notice of. As has ever been the case with Limerick maidens, 'tis the last three or four weeks that count and a very noticeable improvement is observable just now. There seems little likelihood of the club sending a senior eight to the stake boats, and whether a junior eight will compete is problematical. The club will be represented in the senior four and maiden eight, while other crews which will sport the black and white can be relied on to give a good account of themselves.

A.B.C. and St. Michael's.

With just a possibility of a junior crew in A.B.C. and St. Michael's confining their efforts to maiden class, the above two clubs are hard at it nightly. The former maiden eight should keep plugging away as hard as possible. Their style may be more robust than that of other crews, but when they row together they can get good speed in
