Water Shortage.

Great hardship caused by the present
dry spell is reported from all parts of
the district. Cattle in particular are
affected by the lack of sufficient moisture
in the pasturage. The fields are burnt
by the great drought and in many in-
stances cattle have to be watered as far
away as a mile or a mile and a half
from home. This is having a very bad
affect on the milk supply. Rain, and
and plenty of it, and soon is what we
need. The most of the harvest has been
secured. The month of August must
have been the driest on record, although
we heard of rainfall in other places. It
will require a continuous down pour to
penetrate the earth which is now as hard
as cement. Gardens are also affected.
Potatoes certainly are plentiful and of
splendid quality, but there is great
scarcity of cabbage.
