COUNTESS OF DUNRAVEN

Adare in Mourning

Funeral Ceremony

The village of Adare was in mourning yesterday when the remains of the Countess of Dunraven were laid to rest in the family vault attached to Adare Church.

Shops were shut and blinds drawn when the coffin, borne on a simple farm cart, and covered with wreaths, emerged from the main gate of Adare Manor. On either side walked workers on the estate, carrying many beautiful wreaths. On arriving at the church a brief Service was held by the Rt. Rev. Dr. Irwin, Bishop of Limerick, assisted by Rev. O. S. Daunt, Rector, Adare, and Rev. A. E. Hewetson-Jones, Limerick.

Owing to an indisposition, the Earl of Dunraven was unable to attend the funeral.

ROAD EXPENDITURE

Special County Council Meeting

Increased Estimate

County Limerick road estimates were considered at a special meeting of Limerick County Council on Saturday, Mr. M. O'Donnell (Vice-Chairman) presiding.

The officials present were:—Messrs. I. O'Donnell (Secretary), M. F. Ryan (County Surveyor), and R. O'Sullivan (Liaison Agent).

The estimate presented by the County Surveyor provided £33,018 for the improvement and maintenance of main roads and £53,325 for county roads.

The Surveyor said that between the main and county roads repairs this year and last year there was only an increase of £116. Forty per cent. of the money expended on main roads was recoverable from the Government. At the last meeting, however, the Council had decided to provide £6,000 extra for roads in order to give extra employment and that sum would have to be added to the estimate.

The Council then took up consideration of proposed improvements, which provided £2,932 for main roads and £3,450 for county roads.

Mr. Quaid expressed the view that footpaths all over the country should be removed. There should be some places for pedestrians to walk, and he had seen people going and coming from Mass covered from head to foot with mud from passing vehicles.

Mr. Fahy proposed that all improvements proposed by members and 50 per cent. of those proposed by the Surveyor be cut out. Improvements were not carried out in years better than the present and he thought they could wait.

In reply to a member, the Secretary said that he had drawn up a statement of the position.
