Recent Death.

It is with very deep regret I have to record the death of Mr. Pa Glenny, which occurred at his residence, Church View, on the 21st inst., after an illness of rather short duration. The deceased, who had attained the age of 70 years, came from one of the oldest families in Adare and was one of the most popular figures in the locality. Although of a retiring disposition he won the affection and good wishes of all who became acquainted with him. As a tradesman he came second to none and carried on a successful business in the carpentry line for a long number of years.
