### MR. W. HANLY, BALLINACRAGGA.

The death of Mr. William Hanly, Ballinacragga, on Friday, the 17th inst., at the early age of thirty five years, came as a great shock to the people of Foynes. Right enough he had not been well for four or five weeks but he was on the road to recovery when a sudden paroxysm of pain weakened him to such an extent that death intervened. Deceased was very popular with his fellow-workers at Foynes Saw Mills and, indeed, with all the community. To his sorrowing father, sister, and brothers heartfelt sympathy goes out. On Saturday evening the remains were removed to Foynes Church, where the Rosary was recited by Rev. Father Quinlan, C.C.
