**MR. L. C. HARNETT PASSES AWAY**

The death of Mr. Lawrence C. Harnett of Ballaugh, Abbeyfeale, occurred after a short illness at the age of 64, and is regretted by a large number of relatives in the district (writes our Abbeyfeale correspondent).
