## A PATRIOT FIGURE

DEATH OF OLD I.R.A. MAN

The sympathy of Old I.R.A. men and members of Cumainn na mBan throughout East Limerick (writes a correspondent) is extended to the Hogan family of Tankardstown, Kilmallock, who have suffered a still further bereavement by the recent death of their brother, Michael, at a comparatively early age. The strain of self-sacrifice has told heavily on the Hogan family, who withheld nothing from the cause that Ireland, from shore to shore, might some day be free.

"Mick," as he was known to all, was most unassuming. He possessed a very generous disposition and was always delighted to help others out of difficulties. Although up and about until a short time previous to his death, he never seemed to recover his full health after his long term of hunger strike. It would be the equivalent of sending coal to Newcastle to re-state the contributions, of the Hogan family to Ireland's cause from 1916 to 1923, but they will continue to be related at the firesides of East Limerick to the children of Old I.R.A. men who are fortunate enough to possess homes of their own.

The funeral, whose dimensions alone bore sufficient testimony of the popularity of deceased, was representative of all creeds and classes. Noticeable amongst the cortege was the very large number of Old IR.A. comrades from many districts.
