The question of fixing a venue for the 1939 Senior Football Final (1939), between Galbally and Ahane, was before the committee.

The Secretary said that at the last meeting the date fixed for the game was for the 15th May.

After a consultation between the delegates of the clubs concerned the venue was fixed for Askeaton on the date mentioned at 4.15 p.m. (summer time).

Mr. M. Kelly, Ardagh, was appointed secretary.

## DEAD INFANT

### FOUND IN DISUSED LIME KILN

While Mr. Jeremiah Collins, a farmer of Dromtrasna Harnett, Abbeyfeale, was passing a disused lime kiln on his lands on Monday his attention was attracted by some withered furze bushes at the opening of the kiln. On examination he found an old bag, rolled up in which was the dead body of an infant. He reported the matter to the Guards and an inquest was held in the Courthouse, Abbeyfeale, on Tuesday, by Deputy Coroner Michael Cussen.

Supt. J. Kelly, represented the State at the inquest.

Evidence of the finding of the body was given by Mr. Collins, Mr. Nicholas Browne and Sergeant Bernard Lynagh.

Dr. Phillip McCarthy, M.O., who made a post mortem, stated that on the 30th of April he examined the body of a female infant at Dromtrasna Harnett. It was probably dead for six or seven weeks, was of full term birth and died from asphyxiation and inattention at birth.

The jury, of whom Mr. David Broderick was foreman, found in accordance with Dr. McCarthy's evidence. There was no evidence to connect anyone with the matter.

"This list of animals shows cows yielding less and for all practical purposes only be regarded through which the cows yielding between 7,000 lbs. of milk, that while the foregoing cows do after meeting maintenance costs, there is a portion of cows available yields, but eaten up by the animals that are one of the main objects to delete these uneconomic ones with animals of for unless the block animal is prevented to the future. It is very difficult to get a good yield of milk from a cow that is not in good health. The best cow, Purcell, made a record in a lactation of 10,223 lbs. of milk, fat percentage of 3.50 per cent, being £7 7s. 5d., between these cows.
