AGREEMENT NECESSARY.

In connection with the proposal to
 construct a footpath from Prospect to
 O'Connell Avenue, a letter was read from
 the Law Agent stating that this could
 not be done without agreement being
 reached with the people concerned.

Mr. Hartney said that certain people

 able facility.

After some discussion it was decided

CORBALLY EMBANKMENT.

In connection with the Corbally em-
 bankment, the Manager said that he had
 examined it and had come to the con-
 clusion that it was a rotten bank. He
 would not on his own responsibility agree
 to take over the bank, but if the Cor-
 poration decided to take it over that
 would be the responsibility of the
 Council.

Ald. Reidy said that when £6,000 was
 expended on the work it would not be
 rotten, but a splendid structure. He pro-
 posed that steps be taken to acquire the
 bank and have it converted into a public
 walk.

Mr. O'Malley seconded this proposition
 and it was passed unanimously.

VOTE OF SYMPATHY.

The Mayor proposed a vote of sym-
 pathy with the family of the late Mr.
 John Kelly, Upper William Street, an old
 and esteemed citizen.

Ald. Reidy seconded the vote and it
 was passed in silence.
