AGREEMENT NECESSARY.

In connection with the proposal to construct a footpath from Prospect to O'Connell Avenue, a letter was read from the Law Agent stating that this could not be done without agreement being reached with the people concerned.

Mr. Hartney said that certain people were taking up an extraordinary attitude with regard to this footpath. It was a case of the newly rich preventing the working classes from enjoying a reasonable facility.

After some discussion it was decided to open up negotiations with the people concerned in part of the site.

CORBALLY EMBANKMENT.

In connection with the Corbally embankment, the Manager said that he had examined it and had come to the conclusion that it was a rotten bank. He would not on his own responsibility agree to take over the bank, but if the Corporation decided to take it over that would be the responsibility of Council.
