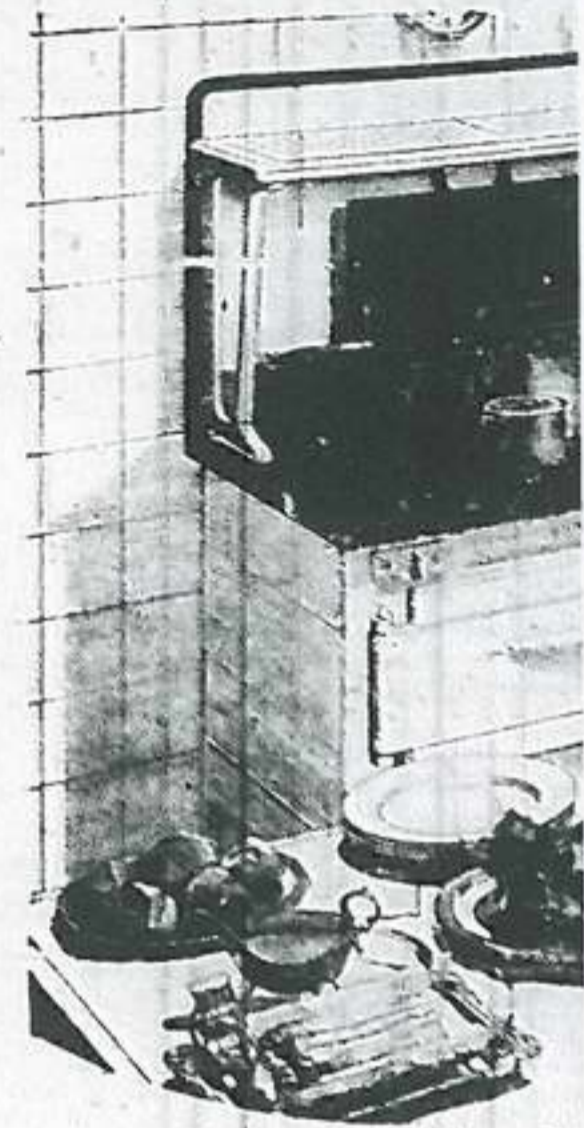

MR. GERALD LEE, CASTLECONNELL.

Deep regret was shown, in the Castleconnell and Abane areas when it was learned that Mr. Gerald Lee had passed away to his reward. This sympathetic feeling was publicly shown on Monday evening when his remains were conveyed to the parish church. A striking feature of the cortege was the number of young men, on bicycles, who took part. There were as many as a hundred cyclists leading the motors and other vehicles. The kind action of so many of our young people from those districts assembling outside the hospital from their places of work in the city and waiting to take part in the funeral procession drew much appreciation from the onlookers. It is said that the touch of human sympathy and understanding is gone out of the country, that the kindness of the old stock has passed away. Anyone looking on that assemblage of youth on the road to Castleconnell would remark that this youthful manifestation of sorrow for the deceased and sympathy with his friends showed that the people retain fully the characteristics of their forefathers, and that the passing away of one who helped the Gaelic cause in his youth, and whose relatives took their part actively in the furtherance of an Irish Ireland was not forgotten. Thirty years ago the late Gerald Lee was one of the finest step dancers in his native district, travelling around to the schools when he had time, to spread this Irish accomplishment. He was then a splendid specimen of young manhood—hunter, dancer, swimmer, etc. Alas, the wanderlust got a hold of him and his years around the United States eventually wore down his robust constitution. When he returned home his health was completely shattered and despite the best medical attention his condition became gradually worse. Both cortejes were very representative.
