## BRITAIN'S LOSSES.

Taking into account the ships cap-  
tured by Britain since the war began,  
the British had lost 122,000 tons, or 1 per  
cent. of the entire fleet.

Continuing, Mr. Chamberlain said

## DEATH OF MR. JAMES LUNDON.

### SON OF FORMER E. LIMERICK M.P.

Early on Wednesday morning Mr. Jas.  
Lundon, formerly of Killeely Co. Lime-  
rick, son of the late Mr. William Lundon,  
M.P. for East Limerick, and brother of  
Mr. Thomas Lundon, one of the few sur-  
viving members of the Irish Parliamen-  
tary Party, died at Watford. Death was  
due to pneumonia and heart trouble.

He was one of that first group of young  
Irishmen who answered John Redmond's  
call in 1914, and joined the Irish Guards.  
He succeeded in joining the Air Force
