LIMERICK PRIEST

Death in U. S. A.

The death has occurred at Olympia, Washington, U.S.A., of Rev. Thomas J. Madigan, B.A., D.Ph., who was born in Dominick Street, Limerick, 53 years ago. Father Madigan was ordained in Thurles Cathedral almost 30 years ago for the Foreign Missions. He laboured in the Philippines, Japan and Mexico, and some years ago he was assigned duties in the United States. His health failing as the result of his mission work, he was appointed visiting chaplain to hospitals in Washington. Father Madigan was a noted preacher and linguist, and his death is a big loss to the Church in America. He received his early education in Mungret College, Limerick, completing his studies in Thurles College.

Deep sympathy will be extended to his brother, Mr. D. Madigan, Loco. Department, G.S.R., Limerick, and his sisters, Mrs. Leahy, Lord Edward Street, Limerick, and Mrs. Cusack, Bedford Row, Limerick.
