LIMERICK CLUB'S SUCCESS

It was a happy thought which prompted the arrangement of the lecture recital in aid of the Irish Red Cross Society in Limerick Technical Institute on Friday night. MUST HAVE GOT BAD FRIGHT.

To Mr. Mitchell—Defendant's uncle was with him and he told him to the best of his opinion the pony was right and that he had harrowed him. He (plaintiff) did not say that he did not care as long as there was no kick in him. He was a good pony otherwise and he wanted to keep him if he could. He drove him to the creamery and he did not cause a bit of trouble. He must have got a bad fright before he got him, but he got no fright while in his possession. He did not bring him until a month had expired. He said to O'Connell that it was his business to sell the pony, and he did not say to take the money and split the difference.

USED TO STAND ON HIS HIND LEGS.

Katie Roche stated that she tried to put the pony to the car with the plaintiff but he bolted around and looked at the car every time they put him in to it. He used to stand on his hind legs.

The defendant stated that the pony was always quiet and they carried him to Mass and brought churns of water with him. He had no faults and a pony of that age should be carefully handled. Something else happened to him.

To Mr. Leeney—He bought the pony from Mr. Hickey, of Cappamore. He was not jobbing in ponies and he got no fright while he had him.

To the Justice—A man named Toole was buying the pony from him before ever the plaintiff saw him.

A BIT SPIRITED.

Patrick Hickey, Cappamore, stated that he bought the pony on the first Tuesday in December and trained and sold him on the first Monday in March. He was a bit spirited. He had no difficulty in putting him under a common car. He only looked for young horses and he told O'Connell to return the horse if he was unsatisfactory. He never engaged a horse.

Edmund O'Mara stated that himself and his son worked the pony to a harrow last March. His nephew had heard that the pony worked in the garden and he asked was he quiet. O'Connell said he never saw a kick out of him. When they were going down the passage O'Connell said the pony was moved and his wife said she was glad of it.

DECREE GIVEN.

The Justice said he was convinced by the whole conduct of the defendant that there was an engagement and the unfitness of the pony was obvious when the man and his wife and servant had to come to him at the cart. In spite of the long time that the plaintiff kept the pony he held that he was engaged by the defendant. He gave a decree for £13 12s., with £1 expenses.
