### COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

The Department of Defence in the course of a letter suggested that one permanent official should be selected to undergo a course in fire fighting under the A.R.P. scheme in Dublin. Each course would last about three weeks.

### WATER AND HOUSING.

Senator M. O'Dwyer forwarded resolutions received by him from the Herbertstown Parish Council as adopted on the 9th inst. The resolutions called attention to the grave necessity for providing a public water supply for the Ballyloundash district of Herbertstown and requested the Board to provide a housing scheme for the village of Herbertstown.

Chairman—We will refer the resolutions to the County M.O.H. and ask him for a report on these matters.

### BAGGOTSTOWN GRAVEYARD.

Rev. Dr. Lee, C.C., Knockainey, wrote expressing disappointment at a letter received from the Board stating that they could not rail in the disused Baggotstown graveyard as it was not vested in the Board of Health. He had previously pointed out that this tiny graveyard, unused for about 90 years, lay in a field uprooted from the cattle, even though headstones were still there. Having pointed out that the last burial in the graveyard was a Catholic one, Dr. Lee went on to explain that all that was required were concrete posts and wire and a gate and that afterwards the local people would see to the care of the place.

The letter also referred to the fact that the pump at Loughgur was broken. Mr. Hogan wrote to Dr. Lee and told him that we have no control over this graveyard.

### COULD TAKE IT OVER.

Acting Secretary—We have already done that. Of course, if the Board agree they could take it over.

The Chairman suggested that the local people might raise funds to carry out the work in view of the small cost involved.

An order was made stating that the Board were not prepared to take any action in the matter.

### CONDEMNED HOUSES.

The Board had under consideration the subject of making demolition orders in respect of condemned houses at Kilmallock, the occupiers of which had been selected as tenants for the fifty-two new houses recently completed in the town.

Reports were read from the Engineer and County M.O.H. with regard to the condition of the condemned houses.

Demolition orders were recommended in the majority of the cases and in a number of instances it was suggested that the dwellings might be repaired or reconstructed so as to render them fit for habitation.

Messrs. R. Fox, solicitor, and R. Geary, solicitor, appeared on behalf of a number of owners of condemned houses and undertook that where recommended repairs would be carried out to the satisfaction of the Board.

### DROMCOLLOHER PARISH COUNCIL REQUEST.

Dromcollogher Parish Council submitted a resolution suggesting that steps be taken to augment the springs of the local water scheme so as to end the present shortage of water in the town.

Mr. Quaid—I propose that we accept a tender for the repair of the old pump in the Square.

Chairman—We have two tenders before us to-day—one for £191 and one for £194. That is a lot of money.

Mr. Quaid—It won't cost anything like that to clean up the pump. I think the job could be done for about £40. It is only about 52 feet deep and it wasn't long down.

The Engineer said that the pump could be cleaned up for £40 or £50 at the very most.

The Board decided to have the pump cleaned at a cost not exceeding £50.
